Patrick Manning is Andrew W. Mellon Professor of World History and Director of the World History Center at the University of Pittsburgh. From a base in African economic history he became a world historian focusing on demography, migration, and overviews of world history. His recent books include *The African Diaspora: A History through Culture* (Columbia University Press, 2009) and *Big Data in History* (Palgrave Pivot, 2013). He is President-Elect of the American Historical Association, to serve as president during calendar 2016.

His research interests include networked information systems, heterogeneous information fusion, complex adaptive systems, crowdsourcing technologies, scalable personalized learning, wireless and sensor data management, query optimization in resource-constrained distributed environments, and scalable architectures for wide-area environments with heterogeneous information servers. Dr. Zadorozhny has chaired and served on program committees of multiple database and distributed computing conferences and workshops.

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
